Security personnel will be on duty from midnight to 7:00 a.m. for any late arrivals and in case of emergencies.

The phone in your room on campus will be able to dial oncampus numbers only. Phones in headquarters and House offices should be used for outgoing calls in emergencies only; the lines should be available for incoming calls whenever possible.

A list of classmates attending Reunion is in your registration packet and at headquarters. Cell phone numbers have been included on that list when available. Information on late registrants is available at headquarters.

Headquarters closes at 2:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 29, at which time you should be fully checked out of your room, and all personal belongings should be collected. Bellhops will be on hand at headquarters all week to assist you with moving into and out of your rooms. As you leave, please lock your door and drop off your keys and access cards at headquarters.

As a convenience for those checking out on Sunday, there will be reunion van service available to the 10 Everett Street Garage. Ask at headquarters for a bellhop and driver to assist you.

TICKETS AND NAME BADGES

All tickets necessary for individual reunion events will be issued to you upon check-in at headquarters. For events that are not individually ticketed, your name badge will serve as your ticket. Please wear your name badge throughout Reunion.

Tickets are required for both the Morning Exercises and the Afternoon Program of Commencement and will be available at headquarters on Wednesday and Thursday (May 25 and 26) only. Due to space limitations, only reunion alumni will be issued tickets to the Morning Exercises in Tercentenary Theatre. All persons, bags, and personal items are subject to inspection before entering Harvard Yard. No backpacks of any type will be admitted. No bag or item larger than 12" x 12" x 12" will be permitted inside the Yard. Guests may view the Morning Exercises from the Science Center. Guests are welcome to join alumni for the Afternoon Program. Only members of the Class of 1991 are eligible for Commencement tickets picked up at headquarters during Reunion.

TRANSPORTATION

The influx of family members and guests for Commencement activities makes the campus particularly lively during this time. Mobility in the Yard tends to be constrained. Therefore, attendees are asked to use the reunion shuttle service and bellhops to minimize disruptions to all those enjoying the campus at this busy time.

DISABILITIES AND CERTAIN MEDICAL CONDITIONS

Harvard University encourages persons with disabilities to participate in its programs and activities. MEDICAL SERVICES

Medical services are available at Harvard University Health Services (HUHS) on a fee-for-service basis. Your reunion name badge is your identification for admission to the clinic, which is located in the Smith Campus Center (formerly Holyoke Center), 75 Mount Auburn Street, and can be reached at 617-495-5711. The clinic is open from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. each day throughout reunion week. If you are experiencing a life-threatening concern, call 911 (9-911 from a campus phone) or go to the nearest hospital emergency room. For more information about HUHS, visit *buhs.harvard.edu*.

SECURITY

The Harvard University Police Department (HUPD) is an important resource if you are lost, locked out of your building, or in need of help of any kind, and should be the first contact for any on-campus incidents. HUPD can be reached with any of the blue-lit emergency telephones in Harvard buildings and in public areas, or by calling 617-495-1212. If you are staying in University housing, ask your bellhop to point out the nearest emergency telephone when you are escorted to your room. Your registration packet includes a room key for access to your room and an electronic access card for access to the building. You should lock your room at all times.

LOST AND FOUND

If you lose or find something, notify the staff at headquarters as soon as possible. Lost items will be kept at headquarters until Sunday, May 29. After that date, contact the College Alumni Programs office at 617-496-7001. After two weeks, all unclaimed articles will be donated to an appropriate charity.

LIABILITY FOR INJURY OR LOSS

Every reasonable precaution is being taken for your safety. At the same time, no individual or committee can or does assume any liability for injury to any person or for loss of, or damage to, property at any time or place during Reunion. If you have any concerns, please inform the staff at headquarters.

Students greatly appreciate gratuities for the services they provide throughout reunion week. Gratuities are optional and at your discretion. All tips will be pooled and shared among the students, who work together as a team.

ACCOMMODATIONS

UNIVERSITY HOUSING

We hope you will be comfortable in the room to which you have been assigned. Upon arrival, you should find your room tidy, with beds made and fresh towels on hand, as well as soap, a bath mat, water glasses, trash bags, and some essential furniture. Upon check-in, you will receive a complimentary reunion blanket for your stay, which you should feel free to take home with you. Please inform a bellhop or headquarters staff about any concerns regarding your accommodations.

Your registration package includes a room key for access to your room and an electronic access card for access to the building for each member of your party. Please keep keys and access cards with you. For security purposes, you should lock your room at all times. Note that in some of the Houses, doors may not lock automatically and must be locked with a key; please be sure to check your doors on the way out.

Barring extenuating circumstances, room changes cannot be accommodated during Reunion. Please keep in mind that almost all beds on campus are in use during Reunion. If there are empty beds in your suite that are not assigned to you, you are not permitted to use them or invite others to do so.

LOST KEYS AND MAINTENANCE

If you lose your keys or have a maintenance problem, please go to the building manager's office in your House for assistance. If no one is present in your building manager's office, especially during overnight hours, you may seek assistance at the Boylston Gate of Harvard Yard, which is staffed 24 hours a day. If you are locked out of your room or dorm, you may also contact HUPD at 617-495-1212. Additionally, headquarters staff will be helpful in addressing any problem.

DAYTIME ACTIVITIES

A full schedule of Children's Program activities is included in the check-in package. It is recommended that parents escort children to the appropriate group headquarters or point of departure each day. Children should eat breakfast by the time indicated in the Children's Program schedule in order to be on time for their first activity. Activities start between 8:30 and 9:30 a.m., depending on the particular day. It is very important that parents notify their child's group whenever a child will not participate in a scheduled activity. Entire groups are delayed if a child is unaccounted for. Please notify the group director or a student staff member directly if your child will not be participating in a particular activity. You may also call headquarters at 617-879-8885 and inform the student on duty.

Note that supervision for children participating in the Children's Program will end at 11:00 a.m. on Sunday.

NIGHTTIME CARE

After evening events, student staff members will escort children in all groups who are staying on campus to their rooms. Until 12:30 a.m., student staff for the Red, Blue, Green, and Young Adult Groups will be on duty in the entries of the dormitories; children in the Rainbow, Canary, and Grape Groups will have a night babysitter in their room. If you are commuting to Harvard, please make arrangements with the group director or a student staff member so that your child will be brought to the Night Program headquarters after evening activities to be looked after until you return from your evening event.

On Wednesday, there will be a welcome reception in the Phillips Brooks House tent. Afterward, parents and children are asked to attend an orientation meeting at their respective group headquarters. When orientation is over, student staff will be available to escort the children to their rooms and provide nighttime care for the Rainbow, Canary, and Grape Groups.

HARVARD ATTRACTIONS

In addition to the specific offerings planned for Reunion, many Harvard facilities are open to all participants during Reunion. Admission is gratis with your reunion name badge. Visit the websites listed below for additional information.
